ATLA Religion Database contains citations to international literature in 34 languages and offers one-stop access to three crucial ATLA electronic indexes: Religion Index One: Periodicals (RIO©); Religion Index Two: Multi-Author Works (RIT©); and Index to Book Reviews in Religion (IBRR©).

Given religion and theology's overlap with history, the humanities, and the social sciences, the ATLA Religion Database is a fundamental resource for researchers in numerous disciplines.
